REDEEMER REFLECTION

MERCY

Mercy has often been defined as "God not giving us that which we deserve."

Thinking of it as a court room setting. You are the defendant. God is the judge. Your crime: breaking God's law, sinning. The evidence is

quite overwhelming. The prosecutor has done a fine job of showing the court all your sins of thought, word, and deed. There were things on that list you didn't even know you did but



thinking back, it was true. There is nothing you can do to plead your case.



You stand condemned. The sentence is eternal death.

Yet, Jesus enters and advocates for your life. "This one is mine," He says. "I have taken the punishment. I took their place. Look at my hands and my side. I died and rose so that this one will not die eternally, but have life

everlasting." The judge has mercy. You no longer get what you deserve. The court rests its case. You are free.



CHURCH RECORDS UPDATE

HELP! We are updating our records and we need your help!

Due to newer and more user-friendly software, and the fact that our basic congregational membership information has *NOT* been updated in several decades, we are asking each family to fill out a short questionnaire of basic current information that will help the office and staff better serve you and your families.

Things get overlooked when life gets hectic, and the church is not always the first notification you make in an emergency. We get that! But we want to be available to serve you in all situations, and we cannot do this if we

don't have basic contact information, as well as family names, and dates of important life events.



We will hand out (and mail) an envelope with an enclosed one-page questionnaire to each family. Please accurately fill out your current information and return it as soon as possible.

Our Elders use this information to make caring calls or emergency response when needed, and the office uses it to send important church communications, such as event cancellations or service changes. This information also helps us provide necessary required statistics to the Michigan District, and can be used when planning activities as well. Redeemer cares, and Pastor and our staff need your family's information so that we can serve you better, and

improve our ability to stay in touch with you and your needs without being intrusive.

- Please fill out your Information Update Request Form as soon as you receive it. Fill out as much information as possible on this form, even if you think the church already has current information.

Request Form is complete and ready to be turned in, please also submit a current family photo to be used in our church directory.



It would be very helpful if you could submit your family photo via email to: office@redeemerjackson.org, but if that isn't possible, you're welcome to turn in a physical photo with your completed form.

We are not hiring a company to take photos; this will be done in house, strictly for use in our photo directory. Dates will be determined and announced after we are able to assess the number of families that will need photos taken.

return before April 10, 2022.

MY MERCY

Have you ever had a day so crummy that you just can't wait for a new day to come? Everything you tried to do, didn't go to plan. You let people down by your own negligence, poor time management, or simply by your words. You hurt people's feelings. You gave in to your desires instead of holding fast to your plans for improvement.

When I hear the sweet message that God's mercies are new every morning (Lamentations 3:22-23), I'm so relieved of the weight of my sinfulness. God has not only extended us His mercy, He's given us the opportunity to be conduits of His mercy to the people around us, as well as on the receiving end of mercy from the people around us too. How can one ensure that our mercies to our families are new every morning too?

- Repent of our own sin and embrace God's mercy new to us each day.
- 2) Forgive the sins of yesterday.
- 3) Love because God first loved us. (1 John 4:19)
- 4) Choose not to attend every argument we're invited to.

- 5) Remain patient with whining, complaining, and immaturity. Remind, guide, and shepherd with calm.
- 6) Give "do-overs" when they aren't deserved. Talk about how God gives us do-overs every day and that we don't deserve those either
- 7) Speak in honoring ways to our spouses even if we're frustrated, hurt, or don't really feel like it.
- 8) Leave the harsh tones and biting words out of our communication.
- 9) Give the benefit of the doubt.
- 10) Serve, not expecting thanks or help, and not keeping score.

What would you add to this list? As you taste the sweetness of God's mercy this morning, consider how you might share mercy with others.

from THE MERCHANT OF VENICE by William Shakespeare - 1564-1616



The quality of mercy is not strained; It droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven upon the place beneath.

Portia's Mercy Speech from the play, The Merchant of Venice, is my favorite Shakespearian quote. We had to memorize the speech for 9th grade English Literature class. Ms. Schrieber was a stickler for teaching the culture and customs that made each era of literature unique, the grammar and nuances of speech being necessary for making each period of time distinctive.

Appreciating the psychology and humanity depicted in each piece of literature we studied, though, was probably the most impressive thing she taught us. Her mantra of, "One cannot write what one has never experienced or seen, but if one can read, one can experience all," helped us recognize how we can and do affect who and what surrounds us.
