Dear Family in Christ,

We've all experienced times in our life when we've been tempted to give up. For example, it's easy to get discouraged when you try something and it doesn't work out the way you expected it to. But God doesn't want us to get stuck in a moment in our lives when things didn't work out the way we planned. He wants us to keep going so we can fulfill His purpose and truly enjoy our lives. God has a great life planned for us, but too often we allow the enemy to steal our joy by causing us to focus on our past.

In order to live the *fresh*, wonderful lives that God planned for us, we need



to leave our past behind and press forward. We need to get unstuck! Problem is, the devil would love for us to believe that, "I've made too many mistakes," "There's no way to overcome the mess I have

made of my life," "I'm too old," or "It's just too late." But the truth is this: Whoever you are, wherever you are, whatever you've been through, it is never too late to begin again.

God's Word is filled with examples of people who were given a fresh start...Ashamed because he gave in to fear and denied that he knew Jesus, Peter was forgiven and inspired to preach at that first Pentecost...Paul was caught in a trap of dead religion, persecuting the early Christians. However, God transformed him and called him to write much of the New Testament. God loves new beginnings! And He has a fresh start for you too, if you'll spend time in His Word and let the Holy Spirit guide you.

Folks, life in Christ is a *fresh* start. The truth is, the greatest new beginning any of us can have is becoming a new creature in Christ. Second Corinthians 5:17 says, "If anyone is in Christ [joined to Him by faith in Him as Savior], he is a new

creature [reborn and renewed by the Holy Spirit]; the old things [our sinful condition] have passed away. Behold, new things have come [a new start...a fresh life]."

However, it's important to understand that growing in Christ is a process that takes time. We learn how to walk by faith little by little, one step at a time. It's like this: When babies are learning how to walk, they fall down many times. But they always get back up and try again. And that's what God is asking us to do. No matter how many times we fall down in life, if we continue to get back up, eventually we're going to get to the place where we need to be. God will lead us to the best life we can possibly have, but first we must let go of our past mistakes. We read in Hebrews 8:12, "The Lord says, I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more."

God chooses to not only forgive all of our sins, but also to forget them! We need to stop remembering what God has forgotten. You're no surprise to Him. There's not a thing about me or you or anybody else that He doesn't know. Yet, when we turn to Him, He still opens His arms and invites us into a relationship with Him.

Our history is not our destiny, but it is very important because it teaches us what works in our lives and what doesn't work. This is how we learn to hear God's voice speaking to our hearts and follow the leading of the Holy Spirit. God loves you, and His plans for you are "plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope" (Jeremiah 29:11). So, refuse to remain stuck in a moment or season of your life when things didn't work out as you thought they should...You can have the

life—that *fresh* start—He's promised if you'll let go of your past and press on in your relationship with Him.

Remember that He will never give up on you! Let that be your confidence as we enter this new year of God's grace and love.

WHAT'S REALLY NEW ABOUT 2021?

I don't feel too confident. What a way to begin a new year, huh? Fingers are hitting the keyboard in mid-December, but I know the way I begin each new calendar year. I'm not a pessimist. Well, not all the time. So, I wonder if you will allow me the privilege of sharing what I think is most important about approaching this New Year.

First, try to re-orient your year around the calendar of the church. "Oh, that is just not practical." Really? I find the older I get and the more I focus on and watch the life of Jesus, nothing could be more so. If this newsletter is out prior to January 6, then you have a visit coming. It's called "Epiphany." And you could not find a more wonderful person to visit than the little man, Jesus. Take some time and determine

to give yourself to Him as a gift. That will be more precious than even gold, frankincense, and myrrh. That gift will be received and will surely be poured back upon you in ways beyond your imagining.



Next, keep your gaze upward. "For the entire year?" Yes indeed. Look up. And not to heaven, as a place necessarily above us, but look up as a practice of expectation. The book of Acts reports, in the original language, that Iesus actually ascended through the heavens. And that He will return just as He left. But looking up is good because it takes our gaze, at least for a time, away from and "above" this world. The world in which we live is, at its best, full of wondrous gifts. But this world is dying. So, look up to a returning Savior who is eternal and never changes.

Next in line is what you and I do with our ears.
And my counsel is to listen to the same voice. That is, if you have had your ears trained on the voice of our Lord, keep it up. If not, then it is never too late to tune in to what is important to hear. And that is found in Holy Scripture.

There is a rather disturbing trend among many disciples of Jesus that we are focusing on what we think God is saying to us INSIDE. Dear old Dr. Luther fought vehemently against this erring tendency in his day, labeling it as "enthusiasm." Sounds strange to oppose it. But he meant it in opposing the sense that you and I can confidently hear the Word of the Lord outside of the Bible. Can I be blunt?

We cannot!

It might be indigestion, our whims, or the flesh outright. But the Scripture is the only place we can be sure of finding His voice clear and pure.

Last in this little list is this: remember who you are. Jesus has identified us as the recipients of all His goodness and mercy. What is critical about that is that we have received His gifts, and at the same time, we always need them. In good old Lutheran theology, we are at the same time saints and sinners. The message that comes from this truth is: allow the Lord to keep you close to Him. Call out to Him in gratitude and need each day—and many times a day. There is nothing more important.

Now back to my "lack of confidence." That isn't pointed at you the reader. It is pointed at the guy I look at in the mirror. But not without hope. I am starting 2021, not by wishing away the "evils" of 2020, but with a great desire to keep moving toward my heavenly destination. I know I flounder often, thus my lack of confidence. But at the same time each year my confidence in the Savior grows knowing this: He is my only hope for a truly *New Year*. A blessed 2021 to all!

FRESH START

In our family, we need fresh starts on a daily basis. Anytime we can apologize and do a reset, we do it. We don't want to let the small stuff fester into bigger stuff. I'm in no way saying we have all of this figured out, but I want to give you a picture of my sinful and forgiveness-needy family. When you need a fresh start with your family, try this method of apologizing:

Express Regret								
Say, "I'm sorry for	,							

Acknowledge that you regret what you did and are sorry for doing it. Don't just say "sorry" without using personal pronouns. Own your apology. Be as specific as possible so the person you have wronged knows whether you're apologizing for what actually hurt them. Sometimes we have a way of assuming we know, and we might totally miss it. Your assumption may very well be something you need to apologize for, but maybe that's not at all what the other person was feeling hurt about. This may show us other things we need to apologize for. Note: If you apologize to keep peace or to placate another person and not to repent, it's not a real apology.

Psalm 51:17 "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, You will not despise."

Accept Responsibility

Say, "I was wrong because/when I

This phrase doesn't taste good. But admitting fault is necessary to repentance.

Include your why. A why is NOT an excuse. Be sure not to use it that way. For example, "I was wrong for speaking to you with unloving words because I do love you and I don't want to communicate with you the way I just did." Your why is a great opportunity to further own your actions.

Psalm 51:3 "For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me."

Make Restitution

Say, "How can I make it right?", "Can we start again?", or "Can I have a redo?"

Assure the injured party of your love for them because they may feel betrayed and feel that if you truly loved them, you wouldn't have done such a thing. Sometimes our words are not enough; sometimes action is needed. For example, "I'm sorry I forgot to pick up your dry cleaning like I said I would, because I know you needed those clothes for your big meeting tomorrow. Is there something here that I can press for you tonight that you could wear tomorrow instead?"

Our actions matter. And sometimes further action is needed to make things right.

Matthew 3:8 "Bear fruit in keeping with repentance."

Genuinely Repent

Say, "I will try not to do this again." Or "Here's what I've learned so I won't repeat this."

Turn-around from the action and make a plan to ensure that you will not do it again. Follow your words with action.

Acts 3:19 "Repent therefore, and turn again, that your sins may be blotted out."



Request Forgiveness Say, "Will you forgive me?"

Asking for forgiveness can be really difficult—it means we ACTUALLY did something wrong; it means we actually sinned against that person. In our own minds and hearts, we dismiss whatever



we said or did as no big deal. In sin, however, heart change is needed. And for heart change to happen, we have to repent and ask for forgiveness. Requesting forgiveness asks

the injured to give up their right to hate and punish you for what you did. It puts the fate of the relationship into the hands of the injured and makes you vulnerable to rejection.

1 John 1:8-9 says, "If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Note: When someone apologizes to you, DON'T say, "it's okay." Say, "I forgive you!" God has given us the responsibility and privilege to announce forgiveness to one another.

Use for a fresh start daily or as often as needed.

YOUR MARRIAGE WAS MADE FOR TOUGH TIMES

Wedding vows declare the promises and expectations for a marriage, even though brides and grooms typically have little appreciation for what's coming. I know I didn't. My expectations for my marriage to Susan involved a lot of "for better" and "for richer" and "in health." Sure, I promised "for worse" and "for poorer" and "in sickness," but I didn't expect hard times in marriage, until we had them.



And in those early years, I realized that marriage is not just made for the best of times. Your marriage, and mine, is made for tough times—which can actually strengthen your marriage. Here's how.

When Susan was in high school, she had a cardiac event while cheerleading at a football game. It resulted in a "code blue," a miraculous resuscitation, and a pacemaker. But I still assumed the best. Then, when our kids were still young, she wound up sick for a year. A new

pacemaker and over a dozen surgeries later, this was a far cry from the perfect marriage I had imagined.

I should have seen it coming. Jesus, of all people, promised it. He once said to his followers, which includes me, "In this world, you will have trouble..." I've



seen what that trouble and trial looks like in a lot of marriages: dying dreams, crippling pain, constant conflict, paralyzing anxieties, destructive addictions, and faithless affairs. But here's the good news: We can get through the tough times together and come out stronger in our love and our joy. How?

By remembering that our vows are a solemn promise.

We can't mean what we say only when it feels right and good. Our word should be our bond. From the start of our marriage, Susan and I committed to one another that we would never utter "the D-word."

By remembering that our marriage is a covenant, not a contract.

...a covenant is different. It's unconditional. It's sacrificial. And selfless, based on mutual trust. A contract is about what you get, but

a <u>covenant marriage</u> is about what you give.

By remembering that marriage exists to demonstrate God's glory to the world.

The Bible tells us that husbands loving their wives sacrificially, unselfishly, is just like how Christ loved us. Pastor John Piper says that the "ultimate purpose of marriage is to put the covenant relationship of Christ and His church [His people] on display,"...love through the worst of



times in marriage reflects God's amazing love for the world.

It's easy to love someone when everything is sunshine. It's the love you see in the storms of life that really shows what true love, God's love, is. The tough times bond and bind us...Without the tough times, we wouldn't fully understand how sweet and beautiful the good times are.

So when hard times in marriage come, you'll make it through if you remember your vows, remember your marriage is a covenant, remember that your marriage exists to bring glory to God, and show His amazing love.

Your marriage was made for these tough times. It is my hope and prayer that you will embrace this truth, to persevere through the "for worse," to fight to the end for your marriage, to love God well, and to build together a

great marriage story for a greater purpose—a showcase of God's love for your children, future generations, and all the world to see.

What have you learned from the storms you've weathered in your marriage?

*Editor's Note: Can you share any of your "weathered storms" with others to help them through their own struggles? Paul tells us in Philippians 2:3b, "Consider others better [more important] than yourselves." Sharing experiences, both good and bad, is a wonderful way to help others work through those tough times.
