# **EVERLASTING RENOWN**

"Who is He who set His Holy Spirit among them, who sent His glorious arm of power to be at Moses' right hand, Who divided the waters before them, to gain for Himself everlasting renown?" Isaiah 63:11b-12

The parting of the Red Sea—the mighty act of God to deliver His people out of bondage—was an act that gained God "everlasting renown." And so, I would think, would be the sending of His own Son; the mighty act of God in the incarnation to deliver His people out of the bondage of sin, death, and eternal damnation. Everlasting renown—to have God's name be known forevermore because of His mighty act. As the renown of the Exodus has worn away, so has the renown of sending the Messiah, it seems.

I was struck this year by the number of Christmas cards I got from Christian families that had absolutely no message of Christ at all. The primary real estate of the card is dedicated to perfectly posed pictures, family updates, and the generic Christmas tree, snowman, or holly berries. All perfectly nice greetings, updates, and images, but Christmas greetings that don't mention Christ? This is a wearing away of the renown of God's name that *should* be everlasting. Especially among Christ followers. I'm left scratching my head and feeling convicted.

Too often, I also fail to maintain the renown of God. He is everlasting. His works are mighty and wonderful. May we not just *know* it full well, but may we *make it known* to all we meet and in all we do!

### ON AND ON AND ON AND...

I think that one of the great challenges of believing in the reality of heaven is that heaven is a place of the indescribably good. It's even difficult to write the last sentence because the words "indescribably good" aren't within our daily, common definitions. I recognize that this is a church newsletter and not a receptacle for philosophy. But one of the things we, as Bible reading and believing people, must do is think hard. And think hard about challenging issues that the Scripture opens to us.

Listen to Moses: "LORD, thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art God" (Psalm 90:1-2).

Psalms are often written in parallelism: one statement following another that expands, or contrasts, or defines the first statement. Here we can pair the idea of "all generations" with "everlasting." Then there are passages like, *"In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth"* (Genesis 1:1). Now there we have no statement regarding duration, but we do have the assumption that God is, and has always been.

Then there's the difficulty believing in ineffable and unstoppable good because all we know is a world that is spoiled and increasingly dark. And our experience of it going on and on and on. Certainly, there could be nothing of the same duration that only houses and distributes blessing. And that with no blemishes. This is indeed one of those challenges we must think hard about. And think well about. We have come through the Advent season, then Christmas, Epiphany and on it goes. Oh, did I just hit on something? And perhaps something helpful?

Do you keep yourself abreast of where we are on the church calendar in any given season? While the beginning of the church year and the world's marking of passing years don't begin on the same date, the church calendar

# affords us the ability to practice for heaven. Think of it this way: Everything



on the church calendar is good. And what do those good things do? They go on and on and on. It's our "great rotation." We're not in heaven yet. Not everything we know is good. But we can practice the good that goes on forever because we have a "holy year" to walk through until Jesus takes us home.

Words in the Bible like "eternal" or "everlasting" reach beyond that which we regularly entertain in our limited thinking. But if we will apply that thinking to the One who is good, who has taken up human life for us, and who calls us on and on and on to His life; if we will let Him lead us through all the days and weeks and months of the church year, through the great rotation, we will have a taste of the incomparable good that awaits us all.

Practice makes perfect. No, in our lives, Jesus makes perfect. As the place He has made for us is perfect. Neverending goodness is tough to grasp. Find where we are in the church year, and walk it with Jesus. On and on and on. Put in some practice.

# **EVERLASTING**

For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life.

John 3:16

Do you have friends and/or family members who don't believe Jesus is their Savior? Maybe they think He was just another do-gooder, or a prophet. Or maybe they think He was a whack-o, and so are you and me, for buying into "that stuff." Maybe they just don't think about spirituality or God at all. How can we make them see the truth?

WE CAN'T! Not our job!

John 3:16-18 in "The Message" reads like this: <sup>16-18</sup> "This is how much God loved the world: He gave His Son, His one and only Son. And this is why: so that no one need be destroyed; by believing in Him, anyone can have a whole and lasting life. God didn't go to all the trouble of sending his Son merely to point an accusing finger, telling the world how bad it was. He came to help, to put the world right again. Anyone who trusts in Him is acquitted; anyone who refuses to trust Him has long since been under the death sentence without knowing it. And why? Because of that person's failure to believe in the one-of-a-kind Son of God when introduced to Him."



But what if our job is to "introduce them" to the Jesus we know? After all, isn't that what God expects of us? We can't "make" them believe, but we can introduce them to Jesus through our words and our actions. It's the Holy Spirit's job then, to "activate" the Word in them. NOT OUR JOB!

Our job is to "tell" as we "go" along our life-path, just as we are told to do



in Matthew 28. We *do* get to help with His work. In fact, we are commissioned to do it. But it's NOT our responsibility to make faith happen. Only our God can do that. But we get to help. How awesome is that?

Our God trusts us with the sharing of our faith and His Word. We Get To Do This!

We have a part in bringing others to everlasting life. How amazing! As I read and searched through His Word for this article, I was astonished just thinking about what "everlasting" really means. It's impossible to get the human mind around the thought of what everlasting entails, but when you search the Bible for where and how it is used, a whole new world of incredible options and vistas open in your mind. Intriguing, what God has offered us, and all we have to do is believe...and take it. And then, share it.

But the lovingkindness of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear Him, and His righteousness to children's children...

Psalm 103:17

Isn't it amazing that God trusts us with sharing the information we have, the knowledge of everlasting, and all that involves? Have you ever seen a truly fantastic movie or read a really great book and then can't wait to tell your friends about it? That's how the Bible makes us feel when we discover, or rediscover, one of God's remarkable promises.
