AND THE LOSER IS...?

The topic for the May *Reflection* newsletter is *Failure*. I have always had a soft spot in my heart for the failure; the sad soul who gets knocked down time and again. I am sure that some of you will remember one of my favorite comic strip

characters named Ziggy. Ziggy is a short, bald, barefoot little man with a bulbous nose. One description of Ziggy's life from Wikipedia reads, "One of the great appeals of the comic strip is how Ziggy himself deals with the endless stream of misfortunes which befall him on a daily basis." Ziggy has appeared for decades as one of the most lovable of losers ever to appear in a comic strip. One of the most memorable Ziggy cartoons for me was one with him reading his message from a fortune cookie. Ziggy's fortune read, "You are short, bald, unattractive, and will never amount to anything." Poor Ziggy.

I like to root for the losers. I want Ziggy to be happy. I want Charlie Brown to kick that football. I want the Lions to win a Super Bowl. (I have more hope for the first two than for the third.) The reason I root for the loser is that I have



done my share of losing. I have lost in many areas of life, including sports. Losing hurts regardless of what the context may be. It can cause us to have feelings of inferiority. Over time we may convince ourselves that we are doomed to failure. We see others winning and

wonder, why can't I?

Why not take a different look at failure. What if we were to embrace it for what it is? We certainly have Scriptural basis for such an approach. Ecclesiastes 7:20: "Indeed, there is no one on earth who is righteous, no one who does what is right and never sins." Romans 3:12: "All have turned aside; together they have become worthless; no one does good, not even one." See, there we have it. We are all failures. And thank God for that. For unless and until we embrace the Biblical truth of our own failures and shortcomings, there can be no hope for a truly God-pleasing life.

With the admission of failure comes the gift of victory. In theological terms, we call this Law and Gospel. The Law convicts us of our sins. It shows us just how far we have fallen short of the perfect glory of God. Then the Gospel sets before our eyes the cross of Jesus and the perfect forgiveness He won for a world of lost and hopeless failures. Rejoice fellow losers, for the loser and the winner are one in the same... it's you! Thanks be to God!!!




WOMEN OF REDEEMER (LWML)

As the school year ends, there are students who are being invited to honors and awards ceremonies to recognize what they've accomplished. Many would view these students as successful. There are also students who are signing up for summer school; those who failed classes or barely scraped by. Many would view these students as having failed. I think the measures of success and failure are a little harder to pin down than that. What if we measured success by giving it your all, rather than by what awards were won? What if we measured failure by not trying at all, rather than by not meeting someone else's standards?

The end of the school year is a time when children, and all of us, can be reminded of our successes and failures. We look back with pride on the moments we feel we gave our all and we look back wishing we could get do-overs for the moments we didn't try at all. I don't know about you, but I hate having failure on my record. Even if no one knows about it but me, I want to do the work again to prove to myself that I can give it my all.

Success and failure and reflecting on the past school year give many opportunities for faith talks in your family. Here's a few ideas to get you started, but you can talk about faith anytime, anywhere as Deuteronomy 6:5-7 reminds us to talk about the things of God "as you sit at home, as you walk along the road, when you lie down, and when you get up."

- Report Cards—Regardless of what grades your children earned on their report cards, they indicate a season of the year coming to a close; a term ending. Though our school work is graded, our faith is not. Talk about how we get our faith, how our faith grows, and what role we have in what our faith looks like.
- Yearbooks—A picture book of the school year that captures memories can be a fun way to capture a little bit of history that you were a part of. It's important to remember things that happen in our lives. How does the Bible capture real history within its pages? Why is it important to have that record of history?
- Move Up—Typically, the end of a year means children are moving up a grade. There is much excitement and anticipation

- surrounding this event. What are some examples from the Bible that people felt great excitement or anticipation? Why? What can we learn from these examples?
- Say Goodbyes—Every year ends with several goodbyes—mostly to people in our class and our teachers—but also to a stage of life. Talk about some easy goodbyes and difficult goodbyes in life. Goodbyes are a precursor (almost always) to hellos. What are some hellos you look forward to because of other goodbyes? How is this like our earthly goodbyes and heavenly hellos will be some day?

What other opportunities for faith talks is God giving your family?

BUILDERS: Tool Time for Families

Have you ever wanted to make something and had the idea in your mind of what it would be like, but you lacked the skills to execute some or all the steps to make it the way you imagined? Or thought something like "I want to have faithful kids that know how to make good decisions" or "I want to have a marriage that can withstand the storms of life that will inevitably come"?

Families today need a lot of tools to go about life implementing Biblical principles in all they do. It's no easy feat! Builders is a new gathering time we're launching to give families tools, so they can be built up and together build up the body of Christ. It will be a monthly offering where family related topics will be shared, or activities will be done together with the purpose of building up families and the body of Christ. We will meet the first Sunday of every month from 3:30—6:00 p.m. Dinner will be provided, and childcare will be arranged, when fitting, after families have signed up so we know how many we need to accommodate. This exciting opportunity will give us all the chance to add Biblical tools to our toolboxes! The aim is that we'll cover various topics for families, beginning with parenting on June 3.

On June 3rd, we'll begin "Visionary Parenting" by Rob & Amy Rienow which will help you capture a God-sized vision for your family. You'll discover why God created families, why He gave you your children and God's grand vision for the family. This topic is relevant to any family with kids at home.

I have a well-marked Bible (actually, "falling apart and should be replaced")



Highlighted or starred or underlined are thousands and thousands of words that have helped me through failures and missteps in the past, and better still, will help me through more in the future.

Now, you need to know that He does *not* always tell me nice things about myself.

"Who can discern his errors? Forgive my hidden faults. Keep Your servant also from willful sins; may they not rule over me. Then will I be blameless, innocent of great transgression." Psalm 19:12-13

But He always shows me examples of others who have walked through what I'm going through, He gives me advice



through a psalm or a parable or a prophet, or relates to me a tale of days gone by where someone else failed big time, and He used it for the good of a whole nation.

Sampson's life is a good example of failures-turned-to-success and used by God. You can read more in Judges 13-16.

The woman at the well is an amazing look at how Jesus can use a failure to



evangelize a village (John 4:1-42).

Through all my failures, He has shown me how to fail-forward. Through His Word and answered prayers, He teaches me, each day of my life, to trust Him to guide me around or through obstacles and pitfalls.

"I will heal their waywardness and love them freely..." Hosea 14:4a

When my failures begin to overwhelm me, He puts someone in place to say just the right thing, or just to give a nice hug or smile to let me know I'm cared for. He shines through the faces and actions and touches of those around me, and I boldly then can step over the lumps and bumps and would-be deathtraps of my failures.

Failures keep us humble, but not cowed or scared.



Failure: why on earth do we have to deal with failure? Can we trust God to give us answers to these questions and to get us through to a new tomorrow?

The answer to these questions is a resounding, "YES!" We can trust Him to turn our most bitter failure into a wonderful expression and admission of faith and confidence in our Lord. Failure is human. who do not yet know Him. Bring them Jesus, and we cannot fail.




REDEEMER LIBRARY Book Review

SCREAM by Mike Dellosso

Good people **do not** always go to heaven. That's a statement of fact. Unless we have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ as our Savior, we will go to hell! Harsh. But true. "Weeping



and gnashing of teeth" true. In 1 John 5:12, we find, "Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life." There is no middle ground between the saved and the damned. You either are or you aren't. Tough truths.

Hard to understand maybe, but author Mike Dellosso makes this reality oh, so real and scary that you can hear the **SCREAM**. "28 Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in hell," Matthew 10:28

Mark Stone is an everyday working stiff like most of us.

He's a mechanic who is dealing with a marriage-in-crisis and a rash of sudden phone



calls interrupted with maniacal screams and wailing. Those on both ends of the phone hear the blood-chilling screams. It's not a delusion. The screams chill Mark, and bring back childhood memories of Biblical descriptions of

hell, long lost to his unbelief and cynicism.
"...and throw them into the blazing furnace, where there will be



weeping and gnashing of teeth," Matthew 13:50.

Deaths follow. A maniac is abducting women. A sheriff is in denial of a possible serial kidnapper or even a killer on the loose. Then Mark's wife is taken.

As he struggles with his tattered faith and his damaged marriage, the phone calls and screams persist, and a madman has Mark's wife. The search for the kidnapper is now terrifyingly personal.

This is the first Dellosso novel I've ever read and it does not disappoint. I struggled to put it down when mundane daily life became insistent. If you want real Scriptural truths described in terrorarousing realities, this book is for you. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life," John 3:16.

A plus for me with this novel, was the author holding his readers accountable to

"DO" something with the faith that they have...share it! A Great Read!

IS UNFROGIVENESS FAILURE?

I struggle with forgiving others when they hurt me. Repeatedly, hurt me or mine. I feel justified, but then I feel guilty. I feel that they don't deserve my forgiveness. Then, I feel mean-spirited. But they keep doing it over and over again, and seem to have no regret and/or no clue that they are being unkind or spiteful, so why should I forgive them?



Does God feel this way when I am hurtful or mean-spirited? How can He tolerate me when I behave in this same shameful manner myself? Am I a failure if I don't forgive? Why don't we forgive? Here are a few reasons why:

Many of us think forgiving someone means saying that it's all okay and forgotten. Sometimes we think it means that the offending person must admit guilt for trust to be reestablished. We may think that forgiveness frees the offenders from the consequences of their

actions. These *can* be a part of forgiveness, but really, forgiveness is simply giving up your right to condemn and handing that justice over to God. It's not neat or necessarily pretty like we want though. We need to let go of our orneriness and make peace, which is not always an easy task.

We need to let go of resentment.

Anger and resentment often help us feel righteousness in our indignation. We need to realize that our bitterness and unforgiveness hurts only us, and possibly loved ones we may be trying to

protect. Resentment and bitterness are a security blanket that will not provide comfort or peace for our wounded hearts. To forgive, we must let go of bitterness



and expose our wounds to be healed by our Lord.

We have to give our forgiveness to someone who is unworthy. We want people to get what they deserve, especially when they hurt us. The problem is no one deserves forgiveness. They deserve to get what they gave. Forgiveness means they escape the "just desserts" of their offense to us.

We need to abandon our pride. We are right and they are wrong. That makes me feel good about myself. The person may be wrong, abusive, cruel, manipulative, controlling, a liar, or a bully. But forgiveness forces us to think about what made them that way. What happened to them? We don't excuse their behavior, but it helps us see a new perspective. Forgiveness also challenges us to think about the pain we have inflicted on others and our own need for forgiveness.

Forgiveness is an act of a full heart. When we forgive, we act from a position of strength, a strength many people don't have. It requires resilience, love, faith, empathy, openness, and vulnerability. Many of us are so damaged by our own wounded spirits that forgiveness is next to impossible for us to handle. As we lean on our Lord for His constant and continual forgiveness, how can we NOT extend that gift to those who offend or wound us? Forgiving others gives us life from a position of strength rather than weakness, through God's grace and His daily forgiveness.





OLD DOG, NEW TRICKS!

Today and yesterday, as I was driving to and from work, appointments, and errands, I was listening to an episode of

the podcast *Invisibilia*, called "Emotions." The episode discusses a different way to look at emotions (most of which was over my head but some of which was quite healing and liberating). One liberating part was the idea that emotions are learned and so can be re-learned or re-directed. The podcast, which cites the research of a professor at Northeastern University, in no way implies that emotions should be stifled or disregarded. (I've tried that strategy, thankyouverymuch.) Instead, it suggests that we often experience emotions in light of constructs that we have been taught or have believed about ourselves or about the world. For instance, I have, for whatever reason, long held the unspoken belief that I have to be right, even perfect—getting it wrong is unacceptable. This simple subliminal construct—"I need to be right"—has shaped the way I have experienced failure. If I miss an item on a test, let down a friend, or break a glass while doing dishes (which I do about once a week), I have failed. Imagine all the mistakes an average human makes in any given day and you will have a rough estimate of how many times a day I consciously or unconsciously give myself the message that I am unacceptable.

Yeah. It's pretty toxic.

Now imagine if I shifted my thinking to be based on the construct that "All of life is a series of missteps that provide opportunities for growth." If I lived my life based on this construct, I would *expect* myself to make several mistakes during the day, and rather than judging or belittling myself, I would instead search around each "oops" for the growth or learning opportunity. I would make no fewer or no more mistakes, I

would just have a different emotional experience...

I am hoping over time to shift from self-deprecation to tender grace. It's gonna take some time, but I do believe this old dog can learn this new trick.

I don't even pretend to know if we will have a summer season in 2018, but all history testifies that we probably will. So here goes. Summer is that season for the famous trek to the beach, pail and shovel in hand, with the kids or

grandkids. It's also the season for kicking back, soaking in the sunshine and for church members ... well, dialing back a bit. Now please don't



misunderstand. We all need respite, and this is not a plea for summer giving or attendance at worship. This is about taking some of that needed break time and making personal spiritual investments. And while I am not talking about pails and shovels and sand, I am advocating some "spiritual" digging. So, what do the tools look like?

I want to advocate for some terrific Lutheran tools for summer digging. We have a tremendous amount of materials to aid summer treasure hunting and even sand castle building for God's Kingdom.


Of course, the premier tool in our cadre is the Bible. And while it isn't a



specifically Lutheran tool, the other tools in the box for the summer can refine our

use of and love for it. The translation is up to you although any of the other tools that are published by CPH will reflect the Synod's choice of the English Standard Version (ESV) as their preferred text. Choose a Bible you enjoy reading. I have been enjoying getting acquainted with the time-honored King James Version in my personal reading of late. The language is not that difficult and reading more slowly can produce some great results as well.

Our classic place to begin, after Holy Scripture, is "Luther's Small Catechism." The latest edition is just out. It retains the text common since the old blue editions of the eighties but includes some tremendous new commentary and study materials that help sort out the Bible's take on the most current of topics including gender issues and



family discussion applications. Next, I suggest getting familiar with our most current Lutheran Hymnal known as "Lutheran Service Book" (LSB). That's right, a hymnal.

There are tremendous resources in addition to the hymns themselves. And while I am at it, may I encourage you to make a regular habit of reading the hymns. Treasure troves they are. Great theology and commentary on the Bible come straight from much of what we sing together. But there are wonderful sections with prayers for many situations, the prayer services of the church, the various settings of the Divine Service, and various liturgies as well as

lectionary schedules and helps for reading the Psalms daily. The LSB is available from CPH in a personal edition as well as the pew version. In my view, every Lutheran home should have one.


"Concordia: The Lutheran
Confessions" is a recent CPH
publication housing all the confessions
of the Lutheran Church. It is reader
friendly and includes great articles on
Reformation History that really help you
"place" the development of the teaching
on which we stand. It's a big book
available in both hard cover and paper. It

includes both the Small and Large Catechisms, Luther's Treatise on the Papacy and all our founding documents. Anything but dry, this is a feast for any Biblelover. Reading just a few pages a day will go a long way in helping you loom ravious and page and

learn, review, and pass on the faith handed to us. One of my favorite resources is CPH's "Reading the Psalms with Luther." This volume includes all 150 Biblical psalms, along with comments by Dr. Luther and prayers to help us integrate the psalms with everyday life.


One category of publications that are

very recent are the books of the "Lutheranism 101" series also published by CPH. The flagship volume named for the series is a summary of Lutheran teaching in an extremely accessible and fun format. Other



books in the series include "Lutheranism 101 for KIDS," "The Lord's Supper," "Baptism," and most recently, "Lutheran Worship 101," which really helps to reconnect us all with the historic roots of the Divine Service.

Let me offer just a few books from contemporary Lutheran authors. These are books that are among my favorites and perhaps they would be helpful to you. Gene Veith's "Spirituality of the



Cross" is a yearly read for me. It highlights the distinctives of Lutheran teaching and gives an account of what brought the author through nearly every flavor of Christianity, to solid conviction

that Lutheranism is the most faithful read of the Bible. Daniel Preus's "Why I Am a Lutheran" is great to focus on the central issue of Lutheranism: Jesus the Savior. A couple more titles are future classics. John Kleinig's "Grace Upon Grace," and Gene Veith and Trevor Sutton's "Authentic Christianity" are well worth your time, as well as Matt Richard's "Will the Real Jesus Please Stand Up?"

I better stop now. You do need to spend some time with your spouse and family at a real beach near you. But while you dig in the sand, manage your



bar-b-que, and slather on that tanning lotion, don't forget to do maintenance and renewal work on your soul. Hopefully some of these tools will help.
