VALUING LIFE

As Christians, we say we value life because the value of life is ascribed to each of us by our Creator. There are stages of life that we all rally around and value in a collective way; take the pre-born, for example. Christians picket and pray to protect the life of the preborn, as well we should, but my thoughts lately have been on how we value life in other stages and other circumstances.

Maybe valuing life looks like offering childcare or cooking a meal for a single parent without question of how they became a single parent in the first place. Maybe valuing life looks like making regular phone calls to check in on a senior who is lacking caring support. Maybe valuing life is allowing a professional to work flex-time or allowing them to have their little one sit on their lap for a meeting without giving them side-eye. Maybe valuing life is being very mindful about how you talk about people who think differently



than you do-inviting them into conversations instead of saying 'don't talk to me if vou don't agree' welcoming all perspectives instead of squelching anv perspectives that don't

perfectly align with your own, and

wishing them the best possible outcome instead of harm or death because they aren't on your side. (I am just as surprised as you are that this needed to be said.)

Just maybe, valuing life is treating each person, regardless of opinion or life decisions or history, or any other earthly qualifiers, as a beloved imagebearer of God because that is exactly what they are (Genesis 1:26-27). Each one has inherent value because the Creator of the Universe made them to have value. No sin, no misfortune, no belief can take that value away.

2 SERVICES AGAIN

Due to COVID-19, anyone planning to attend in-person worship services on Sundays at Redeemer *must sign up* online or through the church office.

We again have two services at 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m., with one weekly archived service available on Monday, through our website at redeemerjackson.org. Redeemer Lutheran Church is working diligently to provide each person in attendance with a safe and healthy environment in which to worship. Please continue to sign up the week before you plan to attend a worship service. If the service is full, please sign up for the next service with available seating. Sign up online. You can also reserve seating by calling the church office at 517-750-3100.

- Seating is limited to 65 people at each service.
- Pews will be taped off to allow for 6 feet of distancing per family grouping.

To encourage safe practices within our worship services and facility and to limit the spread of COVID-19, Redeemer Lutheran Church encourages:

- The wearing of a face mask is required to protect all in attendance. Please bring your own face mask.
- If you have come in contact with an



individual with COVID-19, please refrain from attending services for 12 days.

- If you are ill or have a temperature above 99.5 degrees, please refrain from attending services.
- Before and after each service, high volume/touch areas are cleaned and disinfected: especially door handles, countertops, elevator buttons, pew backs, bathrooms, and other public spaces.

Please note: as in any publicly accessible facility outside of Redeemer Lutheran Church, a 100% COVID-19 free environment cannot be guaranteed.

Communion is celebrated on the second, fourth, and fifth Sundays of each month at all services.

During this pandemic, I have thought a lot about this very thing. As my husband and I both try to make intelligent decisions about "socialdistancing" and "self-isolating," wearing masks and disinfecting items that could have been exposed to the virus, we struggle with these questions. Enter: virtual internet schooling, parents working online from home, groceries and meals delivered via Amazon or Grub Hub, ZOOM schooling, meetings, and teaching. How many of you are dealing with some, or all, of these same things? What a lot to deal with, and new decisions to make every day as more complications are added, with doctor's appointments, virtual homework assignments, emails from teachers, and chats with administrators or tutors.

Normal is not easy to describe anymore.

With our son and granddaughters being with us for the past couple of weeks, our sedate, comfortable life has been shaken up into a lovely chaos that is challenging us to look closely at what is of value to us. What is our "Pearl of great value?" Family, as always, jumps to the forefront. Family is our support system, our foundation, our safe haven in a world we hardly recognize anymore. And bracing this bedrock of family, we find our Lord and God as the Foundation for our family. How wonderful to discover that this Foundation is the cement that makes us strong and helps us meet the challenges that seem to pop up daily.

We're finding that our Lord has met every need, given us the security to face each new challenge, and the strength to stand firmly in our faith as we enjoy this God-given time to be a part of our children's and grandchildren's lives in ways we never envisioned. He is our Pearl of Great Value! And He has scattered smaller pearls throughout our family life as well. What a great God we have!

"THE VALUE IS DETERMINED BY THE PRICE PAID"

I can't tell you the book title off the top of my head, but the title above is a quote from one of my favorite and most cited pastor/authors, A.W. Tozer. So much of his writing has influenced my fellowship with God through the years. And I find that as a Lutheran believer, while some finer points of theology don't line up, so much of what he writes I can see coming from Dr. Luther's pen.

The Apostle Paul is, of course, another favorite. And he wrote much on the "what" and "why" of the Savior's work. Paul was convinced that God's love for us was an everlasting love that was somehow fueled by our helpless state—not hindered by it. But in His coming and dying, Jesus would not refashion old treasure. The value was to be found in what Jesus had created us



to be in our original mom and dad, Adam and Eve. And what we had since become due to their hard skid in the garden, left us with only one rescue possible: the making of something new. So, God's love never wavered—it never does—and rescue was always on His mind. Enter the Savior, Jesus.

"From now on, therefore, we regard no one according to the flesh. Even though we once regarded Christ according to the flesh, we regard him thus no longer. Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Cor. 5:16-17). Not enough to refashion, Jesus came to re-create. The value—perhaps better—the "val-YOU" of humanity as a whole and as individuals, brought about the re-creation of the race in the redeeming power of Christ. As Lutherans, we believe in "Universal Atonement." Not Universalism-the idea that all are saved. But the truth from God's Word that all have been redeemed by Christ and are simply waiting to hear the good news that they may respond with God-given faith. Not all will respond with a "yes," but God makes the offer to all because He believes we are a treasure. Even as far away as we may be from Him. As far away as we walk from Him. As much as we may blatantly oppose Him. God sees, loves, and comes after His created treasure with the life, death, and resurrection of His Family Treasure, lesus.

The Father paid for those created in His image and destroyed by sin (and sins), treasure for treasure. To make us new we see, "All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation" (2 Corinthians 5:18a). All

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this is from God, and why? Because the value is determined by the price paid.



God *only* could have made the payment. From eternity past, God knew it to be true and sent not just his best, but his most precious. Treasure for treasure. Aren't you glad?

SUNDAY SCHOOL IS BACK!

Food for Thought:

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"Why is God keeping me around?" "The quality of Grandma's life just isn't what it used to be." You may have said similar things. Take note: such statements reflect a view of the value of life based on people's abilities rather than God's ability. Assigning value to human life based on mental or physical capacity can lead to the foreboding conclusion that maybe there is [some] life not worthy of life.

NOT SO! All life is worthy of life because God makes it so. He created life with His hands. You and every life have handmade value! God redeemed life with His outstretched hands. You and every life have been bought with a price! God's power is at work in those He calls His own. You and every child of God are instruments of His power (Jeremiah 1:5). Thank God for the gift of life! Thank God for the value He gives to every life!
