

Luigi Tarisio was born in Italy in 1796. A collector of violins, he took great pride in scouting out rare finds, and purchasing only instruments of the finest quality. No one really knew about Tarisio's passion, however, until after he died. It was while his estate was being appraised that some 246 valuable violins were discovered in his attic! One of the most expensive, hidden in the drawer of an old dresser, was a Stradivarius he'd purchased from someone who had also bought it solely as a collector's item.

Commenting on the matter, Dr. W. Y. Fullerton, the gifted Baptist preacher, noted that in preserving the instrument Tarisio "had robbed the world of all that music." And others before him had done the same. In fact, by the time the greatest Stradivarius in his collection was finally played, 147 years had elapsed! One psychologist said, "Don't die with your music still inside you...Don't get to the end of your life and say, 'What if my whole life has been wrong?'"



God gave you gifts and He expects you to use them. If you wait until you can do it perfectly, you'll never do it at all. Jesus said, "You are the world's seasoning, to make it tolerable. If you lose your flavor, what will happen to the world? And you yourselves will be thrown out and trampled underfoot as worthless. You are the world's light—a city on a hill, glowing in the night for all to see" (Matthew 5:13-14).

Understand this: God will hold you accountable for discovering your talents, developing them to the fullest, and using them to glorify Him and bless others.

CHRISTMAS IN SEPTEMBER?

Not really. Do not panic. We have all heard of the more familiar "Christmas in July," which is attached to sales and preparations that get you into the mood or get you into your wallets several months in advance. But "Christmas in September" may be something new and only comes from the printing of this newsletter article for our issue in month number nine. I would like to share a few thoughts for what one might call a "Pre-Advent Advent."

Recently, in our house we have been anticipating the birth of grandbaby

number four. It is going to be our third grandson, and second born to our oldest Jeremiah and his wife, Dayna. Of course, Boppa and Nana are mighty excited, and we've been praying and planning, and yes, buying various goodies since the moment we were informed of the coming arrival. And then there is mom, who in carrying and nurturing the little one, has had a long 40-week trek to walk. Tick-tock. Tick-tock. Daddy "Miah" has his part, as does little Kyrie, who will soon be tagged "big brother."

All that to say, preparation takes time. We should all rejoice, truly rejoice, that the time-honored tradition



of an Advent season has not been washed away by more modern forms of Christian expression. Lutherans and others still hold this season of repentance and joyful waiting for the celebration of the birth of our Savior. I would like to advocate this year just making a few more preparations in a longer season of waiting, not to add to the "hustle and bustle" of an overly commercialized winter fest. But a real and relaxed addition to the true joy of the Christmas season.

Why? Well, back to our household. We have had months to plan for grandbaby #4. And we still cannot believe that a C-section is, at this writing, less than a week away. But we have enjoyed the preparation and planning. Some of the joy is the waiting to meet our new little man for the first time. But honestly, some of the joy is experienced because of what we have known in our past as well. And which one of us doesn't have fond memories of past Advent/Christmas celebrations?

How might this early start to Advent begin for me or my family, you ask? Grab a hymnal when you enter the sanctuary and each week between now and the beginning of Advent, and read through an Advent or Christmas hymn or carol. During your Bible reading times, insert every so often, a portion or all of one of the birth narratives found in either Matthew or Luke's beloved Gospels. Read and reread them until they become familiar places of



meditation. And as the promise of a coming Redeemer begins long before His appearing among us, go back into the riches of the Old Testament to read of those promises and prophecies which fueled the faith of God's covenant people awaiting the "Consolation of Israel" (Luke 2:25).

May I make one more suggestion? Begin with the most sublime of all songs of the Christmas season, inspired by the Holy Spirit and first "recorded" by Mary the mother of our Lord, her Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55). Pray through it and even lift your voice with her as she gives voice to perhaps the greatest and most holy joy a human being has ever experienced.

I'll leave you with some Old Testament Scripture references to start you on the way, but there are many places where our Lord has "hidden" Himself in His Word. Never be afraid to dig a bit deeper for true Advent/ Christmas loy.

Genesis 3:15; 12:1-3; 49: 9-12; Numbers 24:17a; 1 Samuel 2:1-10, cf. Luke 1:46-55; Isaiah 7:14, 9:1-7; 11:1-10; Micah 5:2; Malachi 3:1-4.

Yes, rejoice! Beginning in September.

FALLOW

"Six years you shall sow your land and gather in its produce, but the seventh year you shall let it rest and lie fallow..."

Exodus 23:10 (NKJV)

When a farmer allows a field to "lie fallow" for a time, it may seem that a great resource (the land) is being wasted or neglected. In reality, by allowing the field to "rest" for a time, the farmer gives the precious land a chance to accumulate valuable nutrients and minerals that will enhance production and increase the quality of the acreage and the future produce from that land.


It's easy for soil to become depleted and useless when stripped bare of all its healthful properties through overuse. This is NOT God's plan for the land, nor for His people. Even Jesus took time from ministry to go off by Himself and talk to His Father. He replenished Himself through prayer.

But Jesus Himself would often slip away to the wilderness and pray.

Luke 5:16 (NAS)

We are like fallow ground at times in our lives. When we feel dormant in the mission field, or unproductive and unused in our lives—fallow—we are still meant to absorb the nutrients of His Word and let the peace and favor of the Lord seep into our souls to nourish and build us up for whatever our Lord has planned next.

Remember that "fallow" does *NOT* mean unproductive. Even as we deal



with the mundane realities of poor health or restricted finances or other physical or mental limitations, God still has a use for us or we wouldn't still be here. Do whatever you *CAN* do and don't worry about what you *CAN'T*.

Are you "laying fallow" right now? Maybe health issues have you homebound, or a job limits outside involvement for now. And for some of us, family is our mission focus right now, but we're feeling like "our fields are laying fallow" because we are not "out" doing God's work. Even as fallow ground is working to replenish and refresh itself, so we have seasons in our lives when God sets aside time for us to recharge and refresh ourselves. To make us richer in the nutrients that will give us more of His power to do His Kingdom work in a healthier and more richly beneficial soil, He may have us "lay fallow" for a period.



If you are in a "fallow time" right now, could it be that God is giving you this time to pray and allow the Holy Spirit to fill your fallow time with the nutrients of His wisdom and peace? Perhaps our Lord has a future opportunity planned where you will need His special wisdom to help someone through a similar situation. Or you'll be able to share the wonder of

the strength and knowledge He is sharing with you now in your own "fallow time."

Throughout my "fallow" periods, I have found my Lord in His Word, alive and well, willing and well able to speak to my heart through His Word and prayer. Once I remember to allow time to hear my Lord—allowing quiet time for Him to speak through the Spirit into my thoughts—then my prayer-time takes on a conversational connection all of its own.

When we realize that "fallow" also means "feeding" or "refreshing," then we can appreciate, and maybe even long for, the fallow seasons that will allow us to open ourselves to be "filled and fed," and so prepare us to be able to fill a future need yet unknown to us.

How wonderful that my "fallow phase" can prepare me for God's use in the future, in unexpected ways. Thank You, Lord, for the fallow times that are also a gift from You!

4 DECISIONS YOU SHOULDN'T MAKE FOR YOUR KIDS

Parenting is exhausting, right? I know it's what we signed up for, but still—it's a lot. Not only are we responsible for meeting our kids' basic needs, but we also bear the weight of nurturing them and cultivating their independence. That's a pretty big deal, so we often find ourselves making most (and sometimes *all*) of the decisions in their

lives. But there are some decisions you shouldn't make for your kids. Some of the choices we make for them affect more than just that singular moment in time. They may send a bigger message that undermines our children's own ability to reason, discern, and assert themselves. So here are 4 decisions you shouldn't make for your kids:

1. How Much to Eat

This isn't about what to eat. Of course, we need to make sure our kids are eating balanced meals and not downing Pop Tarts for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. What we shouldn't do is dictate how much they eat. *We should let our children decide how hungry they are and let them eat as much or as little as they need. This is tricky because

kids and mealtime decisions don't always revolve around hunger, and



we do need to step in when there is emotional eating.

But when we tell them they have to eat regardless of hunger, we teach them to ignore the signals their brains send that tell them they're full. And if they *are* hungry and we say they need to stop, we could send the message that food is bad. Our goal should be to teach them to listen to...their conscience, instinct, and even their tummies.

*Editor's Note: This should not mean that your house becomes a café. Encouraging around-the-clock eating can be a trap for that previously mentioned emotional eating, or for binge eating and/or gluttony.


2. Who to Hug

...Sometimes it's okay to make your kid hug somebody, like when Grandma wants a hug but your kid resists because he'd rather keep playing his video game. But our children should never feel forced to give hugs or kisses to anyone.

When we make our kids show affection to people, we inadvertently send a message that they have to touch or be touched by whoever asks them for that—conditions in which abuse can occur. Let them choose who they wish to hug or kiss. We also may have to do some policing with people who nudge our children to be affectionate. [This too can be a thin line to walk, but necessary and well worth the effort for the safety and protection of all involved.]

3. What to Play With

Don't worry. I'm not advocating for letting them play with matches. I just mean we should let our children choose what toys to play with or what books to read and avoid pushing certain activities simply because they are what we like. Have you ever read a book



that was a childhood favorite of yours only to have your child seem completely

disinterested? Parents have to accept that what we love might not be what our kids love.

For parents of older children, this goes for hobbies and sports too. We may be tempted to have our child do all the things we enjoyed doing at their

ages, but we have to remember that our kids are their own persons and have a right to decide, *within reason*, how they want to spend their free time.

4. How They Should Feel

Kids, especially younger ones, use their emotions to communicate. Although their feelings can seem theatrical—these emotions are completely rational to kids. They shouldn't be allowed to throw a tantrum in the middle of a grocery store...but allowing children to [properly] express their emotions tells them their feelings are worthy which, in turn, tells them they are worthy. **Parents of teens**, this goes for you, too! Let your kids *feel* whatever it is they are feeling (angry, disappointed, sad). But remind them that even though they *feel* a certain way, they are still to respect you [and others] and



*express their emotions appropriately.

*Editor's Note: This means that you, as a parent, will have to teach them self-discipline, self-control, and what *is* appropriate expression and behavior. These life skills are necessary for everyone.
